THE DREAM is just beginning.
We can help children in this poverty-stricken
region of Ecuador obtain an education.



Through the tireless efforts and neverending enthusiasm of the volunteers of the Chimborazo Children's fund, the dream is coming true - An advanced school to give poverty-stricken children a chance for higher education in a remote area high in the Andes, known as Mt. Chimborazo.

The children we are helping come from ten indigenous communities in the Huanca Palluguchi area, located 116 kilometres from the nearest city of Riobamba. Riobamba is 200 kilometres south of Quito, Ecuador's capital. The indigenous people are descendants of the Cañari Tribe.



These indigenous people of Mt. Chimborazo are the poorest of the poor in Ecuador with a per capita annual income of only US\$750.

Before the structure started they had only mud huts for learning; with mud walls, mud floors, no electricity, no heat, no windows and roofs that often leaked. In addition to the ten communities we are trying to help, there are over 95 other communities in the area that have no access to school at all. The vast majority of these people are poorly housed, poorly fed and economically ignored. Over 96% of the indigenous population lives in poverty.



The leaders of the indigenous communities, together with some members of the Scarboro Mission team, look after the leveling of the ground, transportation, materials such as stone, sand and mud, the making of the 50,000 bricks, the unskilled labour on the work site, and the feeding of the workers.



In May 2007, we raised over \$62,000, but the dream is not complete. It is our goal this third year to complete four more furnished classrooms and complete the cafeteria and lavatory facilities currently underway. We will do this by having another "Day at the Races" on Saturday May 10, 2008.
